# Unlocking secrets

State lawmakers consider allowing adoptees access to their birth certificates

Joan DiGiulio doesn't know who she is. Until the age of 45, DiGiulio didn't know she was adopted. She only discovered her past when she went to get her birth certificate in New York City before taking a trip to Europe. DiGiulio will turn 76 next month, but the identity of the woman who gave birth to her remains a mystery. DiGiulio said she has given up actively searching for her birth family because it just makes her want to weep. Although her adoptive parents never treated her as an outsider, it was hard to shake that sentiment. "You're an outsider even though you think you're not," said DiGiulio, who lived in Danbury for more than 40 years and now splits her time between Florida and Southbury.

# New rail schedule receives state OK

Adjustments should shorten trips to NYC, Metro-North says

After a year of delays on the New Haven Line, Metro-North Railroad has gotten the go-ahead from Connecticut to adopt a new schedule that promises to make arrival times to Grand Central Terminal the same as before a series of accidents brought a federal crackdown on speed and safety. "The president and commissioner of transportation have had very in-depth conversations about the schedule, and we believe this is the best schedule we can put out at the moment," Metro-North spokeswoman Marjorie Anders said Sunday. "We're pretty confident it will work in that people will arrive at Grand Central Terminal when they expect to."



Anders said the railroad's president, Joseph Giulietti, is expected to discuss details of the planned schedule changes for Metro-North on Monday morning at the Metropolitan Transportation Authority's monthly committee meeting for the railroad. Changed departure times and other adjustments should provide shorter inbound trips to Manhattan for 83 percent of trains during the 6-to-10 a.m. peak, and the new schedule includes arrival times for intermediate stations the railroad is more confident it can meet, according to Anders. The railroad expects the schedule to go into effect on May 11. Metro-North plans to begin distributing timetables no later than May 5. "Usually schedule changes are just a tweak, but this is really a major overhaul," Anders said. Last week, the issue of whether Connecticut would approve the proposed schedule was called into question after Gov. Dannel P. Malloy requested the railroad explain why it couldn't commit to higher on-time performance goals or provide half-hourly, off-peak service between New Haven and Grand Central Terminal. Anders said, spread across the entire schedule, 74 percent of New Haven Line riders will experience

# Newtown authority warming to ice-arena plan

NEWTOWN — With spring finally here, some might find it odd that folks are considering bringing ice sports to Newtown. But as hockey and skating fans are aware, winter isn't necessary to play these sports. The Fairfield Hills Authority is slated Monday to consider a proposal to build an ice arena suitable to accommodate a National Hockey League-size rink with seating for 1,200 spectators and an accompanying smaller rink with four curling lanes. Locker rooms, lounge areas, a restaurant, a pro shop and party rooms are part of a

plan spelled out in a letter of intent forwarded in November to town Director of Planning and Land Use George Benson. Fairfield Hills Authority Chairman Thomas Connors said the letter will be discussed before considering what the authority wants to require of prospective tenants and developers. Connors said the

authority has at times wrestled with what constitutes a bona fide proposal. "This fits into our effort to make the development process a little bit easier for potential tenants and developers," Connors said of crafting the criteria for the project approval. The authority has not voted on letters of intent submitted to the

land-use or economic development offices, nor has it established criteria to be contained in those letters, Connors said. Authority members have stated they want to give this more consideration so there is more uniformity for any campus proposal, he said. In their initial letter, the Newtown Ice Arena principals Paul Esposito and Kris Kenny did not spell out particulars, but the two high school hockey coaches offered a concept that includes a draft plan they worked on with Claris Construction. They have consulted with Peter D'Amico, founder of the Newtown Youth Academy, the first private enterprise to be con-

structed on the campus after the town's 2004 purchase. The Fairfield Hills master plan calls for the 187-acre campus to become a community destination incorporating recreation, municipal services, cultural and performing arts as well as commercial and retail activities. The ice arena is one of several projects proposed to the authority for consideration. "We need a checklist, a way to make the process better, and that will then help the people who come before us," Connors said.

### 'Other Woman' tops 'Captain America'

LOS ANGELES — A femme-fueled comedy beat a superhero blockbuster at the box office this weekend.

After holding the top spot for three weeks, "Captain America: The Winter Soldier" was topped by "The Other Woman" for the No. 1 spot.

Fox's revenge comedy, starring Cameron Diaz, Leslie Mann and Kate Upton, debuted with \$24.7 million, while Disney-Marvel's "Captain America," led by Chris Evans, grossed \$16 million in its fourth weekend, bringing its domestic total to \$225 million.

The PG-13 rating of the Nick Cassavetes-directed "The Other Woman" — about three women wronged by a three-timing spouse played by Nikolaj Coster-Waldau of "Game of Thrones" — helped it draw a larger audience, said Paul Dergarabedian, senior media analyst of box-office tracker Rentrak.

"The rating was perfect," he said. "If you are going for the mainstream audience

who is looking for something that has a little bit of an edge, but not too much, you can hit that sweet spot and draw a large audience."

The release date couldn't have been better, Dergarabedian also noted. "This was the perfect time to release this film, between the success of 'Captain America' and before the official start of the summer movie season with 'Spider-Man 2.'"

Hollywood hasn't yet seen a comedy do especially well at the box office in 2014 since "Ride Along," which was released in January. Wes Anderson's "The Grand Budapest Hotel" exceeded expectations, however, making over \$131 million worldwide.

But Jason Bateman's "Bad Words" made only \$7.7 million domestically overall. Tyler Perry's "The Single Moms Club" brought in just \$16 million domestically. Most of his films have grossed over \$40 million domestically. Marlon Wayans' sequel "A Haunted House 2" opened with \$8.8 million, drastically down from the original's \$18 million debut.

## State lawmakers consider allowing adoptees access to birth certificates

While DiGiulio concedes it's unlikely her birth mother is still alive, she wonders if she has any biological siblings. She is also interested in her medical history, hoping it could illuminate a medical condition that affects no one in her family but her daughter.

It's just one more longshot in a lifetime of longshots.

DiGiulio is stymied in her search because New York and Connecticut seal adoption records. Undaunted, DiGiulio and many other adoptees hope Connecticut lawmakers will soon allow access to the birth certificates of those who have been adopted.

In Connecticut, adoptees have their original birth certificates sealed and are issued revised birth certificates that list their adoptive parents as their parents. Until 40 years ago, birth certificates were open records.

Right now, a bill is pending in the General Assembly that would give adult adoptees — and their children and grandchildren — the right to access the original birth certificates.

The bill would set up a voluntary procedure for birth parents to specify if they want to be contacted by their adopted descendants. Adoption agency counseling records, and court records of adoption hearings and the termination of parental rights, would remain confidential.

Time is running out, however, for the law to be changed this legislative session, which ends May 7.

A compromise is on the table that would restore access to birth certificates for those adopted Jan. 1, 1983, or later. The rationale for opening some, but not all birth certificates is a form has been given to birth parents since 1983 in which they are advised when terminating their parental rights, "the child or youth, upon reaching his or her 18th birthday, may have the right to information which may identify me or other blood relatives."

State Rep. Fred Camillo, R-Greenwich, is a co-sponsor of the original legislation to open adoptee birth certificates. Some legislators are reluctant to support the legislation because of the earlier implicit promise to birth parents that adoption records would be closed, Camillo said.

Others are concerned that if adoptions are no longer closed, birth mothers will choose abortions instead of adoptions, he said.

Camillo argues unsealing adoptee birth certificates will help adoptees search for their birth parents and access information about their health that could potentially save their lives.

Ultimately, he said, health trumps embarrassment.

Catholic Charities, Diocese of Norwich, and Catholic Charities, Archdio-

cese of Hartford, submitted testimony against House Bill 5144.

In its written testimony, Catholic Charities of Norwich said lawmakers should "respect the privacy rights of biological parents who were ensured confidentiality at the time that they made the decision to place their children for adoption. Releasing this information without their consent violates fundamental fairness and privacy rights which are the foundation of our laws."

Karen Caffrey, another adoptee, is a psychotherapist who counsels adoptees and an activist with the grassroots adoption organization, Access Connecticut. Caffrey said her group supports the compromise bill. If the bill passes this spring, Access Connecticut will work to restore access to the birth certificates of people who were adopted before 1983, she said.

Adoption secrecy was a social experiment to protect children from the stigma of being born outside of marriage and acquiring bastard status, Caffrey said.

Karen Waggoner, of Bethel, a retiree who gave her daughter up for adoption, said women had to drop out of school when they got pregnant.

Waggoner, who grew up in Greenwich, said the stigma continues today. Waggoner, who is in the middle of helping to plan her 50th high school reunion, said she has classmates who got pregnant as teenagers and are unwilling to come to the event.

"It was a hideaway era," she said.

Penny Palmer, a Bethel resident who grew up in Greenwich, gave up her son for adoption in 1968. Palmer said she was the only young woman she knew of who got pregnant and wasn't sent out of town.

Today, there's far less social scorn

about children being born to unmarried parents, she said.

But in the late 1960s, not only did women go through the trauma of giving up their children, everyone around them made them feel "so horrible" for getting pregnant out of wedlock, Palmer said.

"I do understand why people don't get over that," she said.

For Palmer, finding her biological son turned out to be a joyful experience.

After finding him at the age of 22 in 1990, her son's adoptive parents became part of her family, and her two younger sons embraced their older half-brother, Palmer said. He has now been a part of her life for longer than he was out of it.

Krista Bradford, a Westport resident, grew up knowing she was adopted as a baby in California. But she still had compelling questions about her identity that her adoptive parents couldn't answer.

Finally, the need to find answers led her to careers in journalism and executive recruitment, she said. Bradford eventually tracked down both of her birth parents. She also met her siblings.

People are realizing that closed adoptions do more harm than good, Bradford said, because adoptees tend to imagine one of two extremes about their birth parents — they're either famous, exotic royalty or celebrities, or they're villains with loose morals.

Secrecy tends to generate shame, Bradford said. It also deprives adoptees of their sense of identity, their sense of well-being and their birth family's medical information.

"I believe in the power of sunlight," Bradford said.

# Shear joy

A spring ritual passed without a hitch last week at Lynn and Bernie Cieniawa's Halo Alpaca Farm in Newtown — the annual shearing of the herd.

Lynn Cieniawa, a retired phlebotomist, and her husband, Bernie, an emergency room doctor at Danbury Hospital, own six alpacas. They purchased four females about three years ago, and two males were born on the farm.

Lynn Cieniawa does most of the daily tending to them. She enjoys "seeing my little guys every morning. They are a quiet, peaceful animal."

When it comes time to shear the alpacas, Ron East of ALPACAboose Farm in Oxford gets the call. "I wouldn't have anyone else do it," Cieniawa said. "He really cares about the animals."

East shears about 5 to 8 pounds of fiber from each alpaca, which is sent to a co-op in Pennsylvania, where it is processed into clothing and other items.





 a faster ride than with the current schedule, while 8 percent will experience a slower trip.

Anders said the railroad has promised to reconsider the issue of more frequent New Haven-to-Grand Central service and raising on-time performance goals after the new schedule proves effective.

"As soon as we possibly can, we'll revisit Connecticut's request about the on-time goals and the institution of half-hourly service between Stamford and New Haven," Anders said. "That is something which Connecticut has funded and is keen on achieving, and so are we."

Commuters already tested by Metro-North's decreasing reliability on the New Haven Line in 2013 faced even slower trains beginning in December, after the Federal Railroad Adminis-

tration ordered the railroad to cut speeds in the area of five moveable bridges and two sharply curved sections of track on the railway.

Those speed limits were part of an emergency order issued in the wake of a Dec. 1 derailment in the Bronx, N.Y., that killed four people. The railroad was required to make permanent signal upgrades at those seven locations and others to automatically stop trains when engineers broke the maximum allowable speeds.

Last week, Giulietti said the new schedule would provide greater intervals of time for track, electrical and other maintenance workers to conduct repairs.

"We've looked at and analyzed every single train delay that has occurred and how it has been influenced by the issues taking place last year," Giulietti said. The new schedule, he said, "will

give us the opportunity to take any block of the railroad out during the off-peak and get maintenance done."

Terri Cronin, chairwoman of the Connecticut Rail Commuter Council, said Metro-North should be prepared for customers to hold the railroad to its pledge of greater reliability, including on-time arrivals.

Cronin, who travels from the East Norwalk station, said many commuters said they feel Metro-North's arrival times at interim stations had begun slipping even before a troubled 2013.

"We want a schedule that is actually going to be adhered to, so I don't feel I have to come in two hours early to make sure I'm at work at the right time," Cronin said. "It used to be consistent, but it hasn't been for the past couple of years. I don't know why they can't get back to that."

# Tornadoes rip through central, southern U.S.

MAYFLOWER, Ark. — A powerful storm system rumbled through the central and southern United States on Sunday, spawning a massive tornado that killed at least one person as it carved through Little Rock's northern suburbs and another that killed a person in Oklahoma.

The Arkansas tornado touched down about 10 miles west of Little Rock at around 7 p.m. and moved northeast for at least 30 miles, the National Weather Service reported. It missed the state capital, but passed through or near several of its suburbs, causing widespread damage in the communities of Mayflower and Vilonia.

Officials reported the tornado killed at least one person in White County, said Brandon Morris, a spokesman for the Arkansas Department of Emergency Management.

The tornado, which grew to be a half-mile wide, turned buildings into rubble and stripped the leaves and smaller branches off of trees.

It was one of several tornadoes that touched down Sunday as a large storm system moved through parts of the Plains, Midwest and South.

Less than two hours before the Arkansas tornado struck, a twister hit the small northeastern Oklahoma community of Quapaw, killing one person and injuring six others, Ottawa County sheriff's dispatcher Kelli Soechs said. Earlier

Sunday, another Ottawa County sheriff's dispatcher reported that two people were killed. Soechs declined to explain the discrepancy.

Five of the six injured in Quapaw were treated and released from Baptist Regional Health Center in Miami, Okla., said hospital spokeswoman Kristie Wallace. The sixth, who was in fair condition with a broken bone, was kept overnight, she said.

## Dog alerts homeowner to fire

DANBURY — Donna Maccarrone can credit an alert canine for her escape from a spreading kitchen fire in her Tamanny Trail home, officials said Sunday.

Maccarrone and her dog were uninjured in the 11 a.m. fire that ignited from food cooking on the stove, said Deputy Fire Chief Stephen Williams.

After turning on the stove,

Maccarrone apparently left the kitchen and was in a back bedroom of the raised ranch home when she heard the dog barking, Williams said. When she reached the kitchen, the fire had already spread from the stove to nearby cabinets, he said. She tried to put it out with a fire extinguisher, but it was moving too fast, he said.

Nineteen firefighters

responded to the fire, and within minutes had doused the flames, Williams said. The kitchen sustained moderate damage, and the electrical wiring in the area would also need to be checked, Williams said.

The American Red Cross was contacted to assist, but Maccarrone arranged temporary housing with a nearby relative, Williams said.

# Sadness of loss envelopes community

Wearing women's shoes with a sequined "M" on one foot and "S" on the other, Jonathan Law High School senior Kurt Holden said being

part of the annual Walk a Mile in Her Shoes march took on a new significance. He was walking Sunday to raise awareness of violence against all women, but also for 16-year-old Maren Sanchez, a friend who was

brutally killed Friday morning in a school hallway. "It's sunk in a little bit," Holden said. The reality of her death, he said, was getting a little harder, not easier, with each passing day. School, Holden said, had changed forever.

Jonathan Law High School in Milford continued to be open Sunday for students and staff who needed someone to talk to. Grief counselors were on hand and students went in and out of the school all day. A large rock that had been painted purple by students on Friday afternoon in Sanchez's memory was buried under a growing mound of flowers, candles and balloons.

A sign at the foot of the driveway to the school warned media to stay away. Sanchez was attacked at school early Friday, stabbed and slashed to death, allegedly by a classmate who has been identified by sources as 16-year-old Christopher Plaskon. Sanchez had reportedly turned down Plaskon's invitation to be his date at the junior prom, which was to have been Friday night.

Sanchez died of wounds to her torso and neck, Connecticut's chief medical examiner said Sunday, as it ruled her death a homicide. Police have not confirmed the role of a prom invitation in Sanchez's death. While Plaskon's lawyers have not named him as the suspect, Hearst Connecticut Media is identifying the teen because of the high profile of the crime and his identity

being widely known to the community.

Attorneys Richard Meehan and Edward Gavin, of Bridgeport, said over the weekend their client was being held in a psychiatric setting and would not be present for his court appearance Monday. Plaskon's arraignment is scheduled to take place at New Haven Juvenile Court, Meehan confirmed Sunday. The teen will likely face adult charges.

"The usual process is, once presented at Juvenile Court, the state will ask the court to transfer the case to

the adult docket," Meehan said. "We anticipate that will happen and be granted."

At Walk a Mile in Her Shoes, Holden was among about two dozen members of the Jonathan Law varsity, junior varsity and freshman baseball teams who wore their uniforms and carried a poster with Maren's picture on it as they raised money to support the Rape Crisis Center in Milford.

The walk, while centered on a serious theme, is generally lighthearted — as men amble awkwardly in high-heels and other traditionally female clothes.

Sunday's event had a more somber feel.

"This cause hits home — this week in particular," Milford Mayor Ben Blake told the crowd of at least 500 participants and volunteers. "Last Friday, we lost a member of our community to a senseless act of violence."

Near the Plaskons' home, a neighbor who came to the door of a condominium Sunday said the family was "not where anyone can find them right now."

The neighbor, who declined to give her name, described the Plaskons as a wonderful, lovely family.

"The kids were as nice as could be, polite as could be," she said. There are five boys in the family, with Chris being the middle child, the neighbor confirmed. She said she never heard them argue.

"They were just a nice group of guys," she said, and called what happened at Law High on Friday morning a shock and a tragedy.

Kurt Holden's mother, Lori Holden, agreed.

"It was a trying day," she said.

Although Kurt Holden is a senior, he would have been at the junior prom Friday with his date, a classmate of Sanchez and one of her best friends, he said.

Holden said he did not know Plaskon very well.

Jimmy Palmer, another Law senior who walked on Sunday for Sanchez, called her a "great person." Sanchez helped manage a number of sports teams at Law, but baseball was not one of them, the players said.

"She was always happy, had a great personality and was just always fun to be around," Palmer said.

He said classmates all seemed to still be in shock over what happened.

"It's tough, but we're all hanging in there," Palmer said.

The Cody-White Funeral Home in Milford is in charge of Sanchez's funeral arrangements. An announcement on the home's website said information about services would be released Monday afternoon.

## JFK award illustrates Bush's political courage

Former President George H.W. Bush doesn't play aerobic golf anymore. And he presumably won't be jumping out of any planes for his 90th birthday in June.

The aging process has finally caught up with the transplanted Texan who parachuted to mark both No. 80 and No. 85 and who once played 18 holes in just 84 minutes at Kennebunkport's Cape Arundel Golf Club.

But Bush 41, as his large circle of family, friends and admirers dubbed him to differentiate from his son President George W. Bush, still displays the civility and graciousness that made him one of the best liked and respected presidents of recent decades.

Two weeks ago, he turned up at Houston's George Bush Intercontinental Airport to greet President Barack Obama during his Texas visit. "When the president comes to your hometown, you show up to meet him," explained Bush, looking good and displaying a firm handshake.

His visit also sent a signal that, though he and Obama are quite different politically and ideologically, the presidency deserves the respect that many of today's partisans pointedly ignore.

That simple act reminded us again of what kind of man Bush is. And an early May ceremony in Boston will remind the nation of what kind of president he was, honoring him for perhaps his most controversial act while in the White House.

He'll receive the annual John F. Kennedy Profile in Courage Award for helping craft the 1990 budget compromise that reversed his ill-considered 1988 campaign

pledge of "no new taxes." That act stirred bitter criticism from GOP conservatives and contributed

"In his first term in office, President George H.W. Bush risked his reputation and ultimately his political career by forging an important compromise on the budget that moved our country forward and should not be forgotten," said Kennedy grandson Jack Schlossberg. Schlossberg, Caroline Kennedy's son, will present the award May 4 at the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum.

Bush made the "no new taxes" pledge in accepting the GOP nomination at the 1988 convention in New Orleans, drawing wild applause.

"My opponent won't rule out raising taxes," Bush said, referring to Democrat Michael Dukakis. "But I will. And the Congress will push me to raise taxes, and I'll say 'no,' and they'll push, and I'll say 'no,' and they'll push again, and I'll say, to them, 'Read my lips: no new taxes.'"

economic analysts felt he would ultimately have to raise taxes. Two years later, while negotiating a bipartisan deficit control plan, Bush was forced to concede that any package had to include, along with spending cuts, "tax revenue increases."

Republican opposition initially blocked the compromise, but a revised version was ultimately approved. The incident not only split the GOP but transformed the political landscape; Republicans have opposed every proposed tax increase since. Later, Bush acknowledged to me in an interview on the eve of opening his presidential library at Texas A&M that his initial pledge might have been the mistake, rather than his reversal.

"With the benefit of historical hindsight, I probably would have not done it the way I did it," he said. "It was so clear and so dramatic that, when I made that compromise for reasons that I think are valid, why it really hurt much more than if I hadn't raised it the way I had done."

The Kennedy award bolsters the judgment that Bush's tax reversal was a courageous act that produced primarily positive results. Along with his restrained management of the Persian Gulf War and the collapse of the Soviet Union, Bush's bipartisan deficit plan illustrates a record of achievement — despite the fact that he would go on to lose his re-election bid.

So happy 90th birthday, President Bush.

## Court in a tangle over euphemisms

WASHINGTON — Anodyne euphemisms often indicate an uneasy conscience or a political anxiety. Or both, as when the 1976 Democratic platform chose "compensatory opportunity" as a way of blurring the fact that the party favored racial discrimination in the form of preferences and quotas for certain government-favored minorities in such matters as government hiring, contracting and college admissions.

Since then, "affirmative action" has become the ubiquitous semantic evasion. Last Tuesday, however, in her 58-page dissent that she summarized from the bench to emphasize her strenuous disapproval of the court's ruling in a case from Michigan, Justice Sonia Sotomayor, joined by Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, entered the euphemism sweepstakes. She suggested adopting the phrase "race-sensitive admissions policies." Not that Michiganers are apt to be mollified by such semantic ether designed to tranquilize them regarding practices they correctly consider discordant with American values.

In 2003, the Supreme Court upheld the use of race as one factor in evaluating applicants for admission to the University of Michigan's law

school. In response, three years later 58 percent of Michigan voters amended their state's Constitution to forbid discriminating against or giving "preferential treatment to any individual or group on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity or national origin." Michigan, like the seven other states — New Hampshire, Florida, Nebraska, Oklahoma, California, Arizona and Washington — that have similar bans on one remedy for supposedly inadequate diversity in enrollments, can continue to use other ways to rectify this.

Although the U.S. Constitution's 14th Amendment says "No state shall ... deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws," the U.S. 6th Circuit Court of Appeals divided 8-7 in ruling that Michigan's constitutional amendment mandating equal treatment

violates the U.S. Constitution's guarantee of equal protection. It reached this, shall we say, counter-intuitive conclusion by reasoning as follows:

wide campaign to amend Michigan's Constitution. If this reasoning is correct, the U.S. Constitution requires that states make it easy as possible for their governments to do what the 14th Amendment, if its plain language is properly construed, forbids. Well, then: Does the U.S.

Constitution's First Amendment commit a similar sin by proscribing "establishment of religion," thereby restructuring the political process to the discriminatory detriment of those who favor such establishment and cannot advance their preference without amending the Constitution?

In the controlling opinion, Justice Anthony Kennedy, joined by only John Roberts and Samuel Alito, stressed that this ruling did not concern the merits of racial preferences, which are permitted within certain judicially enunciated parameters. Rather, it concerned who should decide the merits. Last Tuesday, the court held that this decision must not be placed beyond the reach of electoral majorities.

Which is why Justice Stephen Breyer, who usually is a member of the liberal bloc, concurred in the court's judgment. He was hoist by his own progressivism. Because Breyer believes that democracy — the right of majorities to have their way — trumps most competing values most of the time, he is generally deferential to the preferences of legislatures, and, in this instance, deferred to the results of a popular referendum. Doing so, he remained consistent with

a stance that generally serves the progressive agenda of reducing constitutional impediments to expansive government.

The moral of the story from Michigan is: What a tangled web we weave when first we practice to deceive ourselves into thinking we can gracefully ignore the great principle resoundingly affirmed in 1896 by Justice John Marshall Harlan's dissent in the Plessy v. Ferguson decision. In this, the court held that government actions can take cognizance of race if the resulting treatment of racial groups is "separate but equal." Justice Antonin Scalia, joined by Justice Clarence Thomas, concluded his concurrence in the court's judgment about Michigan this way:

"As Justice Harlan observed over a century ago, 'Our Constitution is colorblind, and neither knows nor tolerates classes among citizens.' The people of Michigan wish the same for their governing charter. It would be shameful for us to stand in their way."

## Popes John Paul II, John XXIII named saints

VATICAN CITY — Pope Francis proclaimed sainthood Sunday for Popes John Paul II and John XXIII, the first time in the church's long history that two former popes have been canonized at the same time.

Hundreds of thousands of people crammed into St. Peter's Square and nearby streets for the ceremony, which was followed by a Mass celebrated by Pope Francis.

Adding to the uniqueness of the event was the presence of a former pope, Benedict XVI, Francis' predecessor, who retired last year.

Also attending, the Vatican said, were 150 cardinals, 700 bishops, 24 heads of state and 93 official delegations.

Once the ceremony began at 10 a.m. local time, Francis was asked three times if John XXIII and John Paul II should be saints, as protocol requires. He responded by reading the Latin canonization text: "We declare and define John XXIII and John Paul II be saints and we enroll them among the saints, decreeing that they are to be venerated as such by the whole Church."

Relics of the two new saints were then placed in view.

For Saint John Paul II, the relic chosen was a vial of his blood, already used at his beatification in 2011. Saint John XXIII's relic was a small piece of skin taken after his body was exhumed for his 2000 beatification.

In his subsequent homily, Pope Francis paid homage to his newly canonized predecessors, stating: "They were priests, bishops and

popes of the 20th century. They lived through the tragic events of that century, but they were not overwhelmed by them."

While John Paul II is by far the more popular and better known of the new saints, Francis indicated he holds John XXIII in high esteem for calling in 1962 for the Second Vatican Council. The so-called

Vatican II process modernized the Church and led to numerous reforms, including allowing vernacular languages to replace Latin at Mass and having priests face worshippers during services.

"In convening the Council, John XXIII showed an exquisite openness to the Holy Spirit," Francis said.

John XXIII, born Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli, served as pontiff less than five years, from 1958 until his death in 1963. He didn't live to see the achievements of Vatican II.

Referring to John Paul II, Francis added: "In his own service to the People of God, John Paul II was the pope of the family."

Born Karol Wojtya in Wadowice, Poland, John Paul II became the first non-Italian pope in more than four centuries when he was elected in 1978. He reigned for almost 27 years, visiting more than 100 countries during his tenure as one of the world's most-traveled leaders. John Paul II is widely regarded as being a major force in the collapse of communism and the fall of the Soviet Union.

As Sunday's ceremony drew to a close, 700 priests and deacons spread out among the crowd in St. Peter's Square to give communion.

An estimated 800,000 people descended on Rome for the dual canonizations, a Vatican spokesman said, with 500,000 in and around the Vatican on Sunday and another 300,000 watching the event on giant TV screens set up around Rome.

Some camped out around St. Peter's on Saturday night to grab a spot in the square. Others attended all-night prayer vigils and confession at 11 churches around Rome, where prayers were said in seven languages.

With St. Peter's filled with worshippers, police turned people away early Sunday. Thousands headed for designated areas in Rome where giant TV screens had been erected to show the ceremony.

Many Polish worshippers, who came to Vatican City in large numbers to honor their countryman, headed for Piazza Navona in the center of Rome, where the church of Sant'Agnese in Agone was offering prayers in Polish.

## Pro-Russians hold observers

SLOVYANSK, Ukraine — Pro-Russian militants in camouflage fatigues and black balaclavas paraded captive European military observers before the media on Sunday, hours after three Ukrainian security guards were shown on Russian TV bloodied, blindfolded and stripped of their trousers and shoes, their arms bound with packing tape.

The provocative displays came as the increasingly ruthless pro-Russian insurgency in the east turns to hostage-taking as an ominous new tactic.

Germany's foreign minister condemned the appearance as "revolting" and a violation of the men's dignity. Four members of the team are German.

One of the observers, a Swedish officer, was released later in the day for medical reasons.

Dozens of people are being held hostage, including journalists and pro-Ukraine activists, in makeshift jails in Slovyansk in the heart of the separatists' territory, as the pro-Russian insurgents strengthen their control in the east in defiance of the interim government in Kiev and its Western supporters.

Also on Sunday, a crowd of several hundred pro-Russia activists stormed the television broadcasting center in Donetsk, the regional capital of eastern Ukraine, to demand that Russian state channels be put back on the air. The Kiev government last month blocked broadcast of the Russian channels, which serve as propaganda tools for the Kremlin.

The crowd included several dozen men wearing camouflage fatigues and face masks, the standard uniform of the pro-Russia forces that have seized government buildings in at least 10 cities in eastern Ukraine.

Col. Axel Schneider from Germany, who spoke for the group of military observers detained on Friday, stressed that they were on a diplomatic mission under the auspices of the Organization of Security and Coopera-

tion in Europe and weren't spying for NATO, as the insurgents claim.

Schneider said additional proof of this was the participation of the officer from Sweden, which is not a member of NATO.

The observers appeared nervous as they were escorted by armed men into the Slovyansk city hall for the news conference and then led away.

Referring to himself and his team as "guests" under the "protection" of the city's self-proclaimed mayor, Schneider said they were being treated as well as possible under the circumstances.

## Misses deadline

## Syria pressed on weapons

GENEVA — Syria missed its second deadline for the destruction of its chemical weapons arsenal on Sunday, but it may be only days away from completing the job, according to international experts overseeing the process.

The Syrian government had agreed to complete the

destruction of about 1,200 tons of chemical agents by April 27 after missing a February deadline, but by Sunday it had shipped out or destroyed 92.5 percent of the arsenal, said Sigrid Kaag, the coordinator of the joint mission by the United Nations and the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons.

Syria had made "significant progress" but needed to ensure that the remaining 7.5-8 percent of the arsenal was destroyed by the end of the month, Kaag said in Damascus, according to a report by The Associated Press. She urged the government to "go for that last push" to reach "100 percent removal and destruction."

If Syria completes the destruction of its chemical arsenal, it would be a critical step toward demonstrating its commitment to getting rid of its entire chemical weapons program by the end of June, as the government had agreed in a deal negotiated by the United States and Russia and prompted by outrage over the Aug. 21 chemical weapons attack in a Damascus suburb.

## Malaysia pressed

## Obama addresses human rights

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia — President Barack Obama on Sunday pressed the Malaysian government to improve its human rights record and appealed to Southeast Asia's teeming youth population to stand up for the rights of minorities and the rule of law.

Yet Obama skipped a golden chance to promote that human rights agenda, declining to meet with opposition leader Anwar Ibrahim. Instead, he directed national security adviser Susan Rice to see Obama on Monday.

Obama said his decision was "not indicative of our lack of concern" about the former deputy prime minister who recently was convicted for the second time on sodomy charges, which the U.S. and international human rights groups contend are politically motivated.

Obama said he had raised his concerns about Malaysia's restrictions on political freedoms during meetings with Prime Minister Najib Razak.

"Those values are at the core of who the U.S. is, but also I think are a pretty good gauge of whether a society is going to be successful in the 21st century or not," Obama said during a news conference with Najib.

## 'Heinous crime'

## Abbas denounces the Holocaust

JERUSALEM — The Palestinian president on Sunday called the Holocaust "the most heinous crime" of modern history, voicing a rare acknowledgment of Jewish suffering shortly before Israel held its annual memorial for victims of the Nazi genocide.

President Mahmoud Abbas' announcement appeared to be aimed at reaching out to Israeli public opinion at a time of deep crisis in U.S.-backed peace efforts. Israelis frequently claim the Palestinians are not sincere about wanting peace.

While Israel's national Holocaust memorial said Abbas' comments may be a step in the right direction, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu

brushed them aside.

He said the Abbas' renewed attempts to reconcile with the Islamic militant movement Hamas raised doubts about the Palestinian leader's intentions. Hamas, a movement sworn to Israel's destruction, has questioned the Holocaust and blocked the subject from being taught in schools in the Gaza Strip.

"President Abbas can't have it both ways. He can't say the Holocaust was terrible, but at the same time embrace those who deny the Holocaust and seek to perpetrate another destruction of the Jewish people," Netanyahu told CNN.

## Supreme Court

## Justices take up role of cellphone

WASHINGTON — Two Supreme Court cases about police searches of cellphones without warrants present vastly different views of the ubiquitous device.

Is it a critical tool for a criminal or is it an American's virtual home?

How the justices answer that question could determine the outcome of the cases being argued Tuesday. A drug dealer and a gang member want the court to rule that the searches of their cellphones after their arrest violated their right to privacy in the digital age.

The Obama administration and California, defending the searches, say cellphones are no different from anything else a person may be carrying when arrested. Police may search those items without a warrant under a line of high court cases reaching back 40 years.

What's more, said Donald Verrilli Jr., the administration's top Supreme Court lawyer, "Cellphones are now critical tools in the commission of crimes."

Librarians, the news media, defense lawyers and civil liberties groups on the right and left are trying to convince the justices that they should take a broad view of the privacy issues raised when police have unimpeded access to increasingly powerful devices that may contain a wealth of personal data.

## Gee not 'sexy' but sharp, Young belts 2-run HR

NEW YORK — For a pitcher with little buzz, Dillon Gee has transformed into a top starter.

He nearly came away with his first professional shutout Sunday, limiting the Miami Marlins to three singles over eight innings in the New York Mets' 4-0 victory.

"I'm not sure if Dillon is all that sexy of a pitcher," Mets captain David Wright said. "He just goes out there and gets the job done."

Gee never topped 90 mph against the Marlins. Still, he didn't allow a runner past

second base.

"He's not going to impress you with the radar gun. He's not going to strike a lot of guys out," Wright said. "But what he's going to do is induce a lot of ground balls, pound the strike zone. And he's going to go out there and know how to pitch."

Chris Young hit a two-run homer, and Wright had an RBI double and an outstanding sliding, over-the-shoulder catch of a foul pop with his back to the plate as the Mets took two of three in the series.

Pitching a day before his 28th birthday, Gee (2-1) had the longest outing of a Mets

pitcher since last August. He struck out six, walked four and threw 110 pitches — his high since May 30, 2012, against Philadelphia. That was six weeks before season-ending surgery to repair a damaged artery in his right shoulder.

He tried to talk Mets manager Terry Collins into letting him get a complete game. Gee has just four in 162 pro starts over eight years.

"CG chances don't come along that often. It would have been nice," Gee said.

Collins wasn't taking any chances, especially after Gee needed 23 pitches to navi-

gate a 1-2-3 eighth. Coming in, batters were hitting .187 off Gee through the first six innings and .385 from the seventh on.

"The one thing I didn't want to have happen is fourth time through the lineup, to have him hang a slider with a 113th pitch and have something go into the seats," Collins said.

Gee is 12-6 with a 2.75 ERA since last May 30. That's the eighth-best ERA in the major leagues, according to STATS, just ahead of Adam Wainwright and Madison Bumgarner.

"Probably pretty under the radar, like I think a lot

of players in this room," Wright said. "We don't necessarily have a lineup full or a pitching rotation full of household names."

Carlos Torres followed with a perfect ninth that finished a three-hitter. The Marlins felt flummoxed by Gee, who is 3-0 in five starts against them.

"He's got a good sinker. He uses a cutter, curveball. He's always got that changeup," Jarrod Saltalamacchia said.

Tom Koehler (2-2), who was born in Bronx and grew up in New Rochelle, allowed four runs, five hits and four walks in five innings.

NEW YORK — Mark Teixeira hit a tying homer and Jacoby Ellsbury scored the go-ahead run thanks to a passed ball and wild pitch in the eighth inning, sending the New York Yankees to a 3-2 victory over the Los Angeles Angels on Sunday night.

Masahiro Tanaka struck out a season-high 11, including Mike Trout twice, and overcame an early bout of wildness in a tight pitchers' duel with Angels righthander Garrett Richards. Neither starter received a decision, leaving both undefeated this year.

The Yankees took two of three in the series and have won 10 of 14 overall.

David Freese homered for the Angels, who went 4-5 on a tough road trip to Detroit, Washington and New York.

Tanaka walked four in 6 1-3 innings against the Angels, who began the day leading the majors in homers. The \$155 million rookie was on the hook for his first loss since August 2012 in Japan until Teixeira homered leading off the seventh.

New York broke the tie without a hit in the eighth, a rough inning for Angels catcher Chris Iannetta.

With the score 2-all, Michael Kohn (1-1) walked Ellsbury and Carlos Beltran. Nick Maronde relieved, and both runners advanced on Iannetta's passed ball.

Brian McCann barely stayed alive with a couple of foul tips, and Maronde bounced a breaking ball in front of the plate. The ball ricocheted off Iannetta and far enough away for Ellsbury to score easily.

Adam Warren (1-1) struck out two in 1 2-3 scoreless innings. David Robertson worked the ninth for his fourth save and second in two days.


With a runner on second, Robertson struck out pinch-hitter Raul Ibanez to end it — seconds before security workers tackled a fan who ran into the outfield.

## Rangers take control

## Rangers 1 win away as series goes back to Philly

NEW YORK — Henrik Lundqvist didn't allow a bad ending to the second period wreck an otherwise good day for the New York Rangers.

Lundqvist was the beneficiary of a three-goal lead that was trimmed to two when the Philadelphia Flyers got their power play to work in the closing seconds of the middle period. But the Rangers kept it together in the third, withstood a late surge, and pushed the Flyers to the brink of elimination with a 4-2 victory Sunday.

"The biggest part to me was to calm down and not be too upset about it," Lundqvist said of Vinny Lecavalier's goal with 32.6 seconds left that made it 3-1. "It is really frustrating to sit here when you give up a goal like that late in the period."

"It was just about letting it go and being focused on the right things going into the third."

Brad Richards and Dominic Moore scored in the second to make it 3-0. Lundqvist stopped 24 shots and didn't face more than 10 in any period. The only other puck that got past him was Claude Giroux's goal with 1:29 left after the Flyers pulled goalie Steve Mason.

Defenseman Marc Staal gave the Rangers the lead in the first, and Brian Boyle ended the drama with an empty-net goal with 15 seconds remaining. Moore helped seal the win when he raced up ice to negate an icing call and fed Boyle.

New York leads the series 3-2 and can advance to the second round with a win Tuesday in Philadelphia. If necessary, a deciding seventh game would be back at Madison Square Garden on Wednesday.

The teams have alternated wins this series.

"We took back the advantage, and we have to win one now," Richards said. "We put ourselves in a good position. We were in control for most of the game. They got a little sneaky there at the end."

Mason wasn't nearly as sharp in his second straight start following a late-season injury. He stopped 18 shots after his 37-save effort in a 2-1 victory in Game 4 got the Flyers even.

"As you go through a series, you have to keep elevating your game because the other side will," Rangers forward Martin St. Louis said. "I thought we did that, and we got rewarded."

## Silver's 1st crisis as commissioner has arrived

Adam Silver's first crisis of his short tenure as NBA commissioner has arrived, a race-tinged scandal leaving those associated with the game wondering how strongly and swiftly the league will respond.

Allegations that Los Angeles Clippers owner Donald Sterling was caught on tape making racist comments rapidly overshadowed perhaps the most entertaining opening playoff round in

league history. The recording was first released by TMZ, and there still has been no official confirmation that Sterling is on the tape. Another tape was released Sunday by Deadspin.

Silver's first priority is verifying Sterling's voice is in the recording. From there, Silver's next move remains unclear. He works for the owners — and so far that group seems to have no sympathy for Sterling's latest controversy.

"I'm obviously disgusted

that a fellow team owner could hold such sickening and offensive views," said Michael Jordan, the six-time NBA champion player who owns the Charlotte Bobcats. "I'm confident that Adam Silver will make a full investigation and take appropriate action quickly."

Miami owner Micky Arison called the comments "offensive, appalling and very sad."

Silver started as commissioner Feb. 1, replacing the retired David Stern, who

once famously said that the league decided to suspend Ron Artest — now Metta World Peace — for virtually an entire season by a vote that was "unanimous." By that, he meant the vote was 1-0, his being the lone voice that mattered.

On this, Silver probably needs more of a consensus.

The players union, still without an executive director since firing Billy Hunter in February 2013, asked former NBA All-Star and

# Record 6 Dominicans fill Blue Jays starting lineup

TORONTO — Run support has been hard to come by for Boston's Jon Lester all season, and Sunday was the same story.

Melky Cabrera, one of a record six players from the Dominican Republic in Toronto's starting lineup, hit a go-ahead double and the Blue Jays ended a season-worst four-game losing streak, beating the Red Sox 7-1.

Lester (2-4) allowed four runs and five hits in seven innings. He walked none, struck out seven and threw a season-high 122 pitches.

The left-hander came in with the lowest run support of any Red Sox starter at 2.67 runs per nine innings, but said he wasn't bothered by the fact his batters only managed to score once in his favor.

"I don't get to hit and if I did, it would probably be worse," Lester said.

Lester went 4-0 with a 2.55 ERA in six starts against the Blue Jays last year but couldn't extend that streak of success.

"I thought I threw the ball well," Lester said. "I made a couple mistakes and they made me pay for it later in the

game." Red Sox manager John Farrell said Lester deserved a better fate.

Juan Francisco served as the designated hitter, batting sixth, and outfielder Moises

Sierra batted seventh. Esmil Rogers, the seventh Dominican player on Toronto's 25-man roster, struck out the side in the ninth.

In Toronto's clubhouse following the game, Bautista and Rogers were using their phones to snap photos of the lineup card, which the Dominican players had autographed. Bautista said he intended to have it framed and sent to a museum in his homeland.

R.A. Dickey (2-3) won for the first time in four starts.

current Sacramento Mayor Kevin Johnson to take a leading role on the players' behalf.

Kevin Johnson said he called an emergency phone meeting of every player representative to the union Saturday and spoke with Silver before the Warriors-Clippers game Sunday. Calling it a "defining moment" for the league and commissioner, Johnson said the players trust Silver will accommodate their requests, which include:

—Sterling doesn't attend any NBA games for the rest of the playoffs because of the "enormous distraction."

—Give a full account of past allegations of discrimination by Sterling and why the league never sanctioned him.

—Explain the range of penalties that the league could bring against Sterling.

—Assurance the NBA and the union will be partners in the investigation.

—A decisive ruling, hopefully before the Clippers host the Warriors for Game 5 on Tuesday night in Los Angeles.

"They trust that Adam Silver will do the right thing," Johnson said.

The league and the Clippers are investigating, though ultimately the decision will be perceived as Silver's.

"He's got to come down hard," Hall of Fame player Magic Johnson, who was referenced on the audio recording, said Sunday on ABC.

The NBA Constitution is not public, though it's understood the commissioner's powers are broad when it

comes to dealing with matters deemed "prejudicial or detrimental to the best interests of basketball." A fine, a suspension, a demand for sensitivity training, all that and more is surely at Silver's disposal.

It seems probable some sort of resolution comes before Game 5 of the series in Los Angeles.

"We're going home now," Clippers coach Doc Rivers said after Sunday's 118-97 loss. "Usually that would mean we're going to our safe haven. And I don't even know if that's true, to be honest."

Sterling agreed to not attend Sunday's game, though his wife — who has filed suit against the woman alleged to be on the tape — was present. There could be more audio coming.

# Husband's kids are part of package

**Dear Annie:** My husband and I have been married for three years. He has three teenage children from a previous marriage.

His ex-wife is manipulative and controlling. She gets my husband to fix her stairs, give her gas money and pay for the kids' school trips and extras, even though that is part of the child support. And somehow, we always end up with the kids here. Every weekend, she coincidentally "has to work." My husband and I have no time to be alone together. His ex has brainwashed the kids about me, convincing them I'm a horrible person and a threat to their existence.

She is trying to destroy our marriage, and it has caused major stress. My husband always takes the path of least resistance, which means doing whatever she asks. They text back and forth for hours on end, and she calls daily and not about the kids. It has reached the point where my husband hides all communication with her and deletes her texts so I can't see them. I'm sure it's so we won't fight about it.

My husband was emotionally abused by this woman for 15 years. He is a good person with a heart of gold, but she's taught the kids that Dad is a mean, crabby person. Any discipline or

rules he tried to enforce were undermined by his ex in front of the kids. My husband now does the "guilt parenting," not wanting to upset the kids or the ex, so the kids have no rules and are given everything they want.

I'm also losing trust, because my husband is so secretive about everything pertaining to her or the children. He refuses counseling. He seems more concerned about his ex than about our marriage. Any advice?

*Hurt and Confused*

**Dear Hurt:** Your husband is more concerned about losing his children's affection (not his ex) than anything else.

She is a nightmare, but he won't stand up for himself. And when it turns into an argument with you, it only adds to the problem. We know you want "alone" time, but his kids are part of the package, and you must schedule around them, the same as any other parent. # Migraine meds not safe in pregnancy

**Dear Dr. Roach:** I am eight weeks pregnant, and I had migraines before I was pregnant. (I was on prescriptions until I started family planning last year.) I always took medicine at the onset of these occurrences, and halfway through the day, my migraine would subside. Usually I'd take between four and six Excedrin Migraine pills, or Aleve. Now I am getting very bad headaches during the pregnancy, and I am worried about taking OTC medicines. Is there a safe supplement to help my bad headaches while I am pregnant?

**Answer:** Migraine headaches often get worse during pregnancy because of hormonal fluctuations. Many of the prescription medications are not considered safe during pregnancy, and I understand why many pregnant women are reluctant to take any medications.

Unfortunately, not all supplements are safe during pregnancy. For example, vitamin A in very high doses (greater than 10,000 IU daily) is clearly unsafe in pregnancy. However, there are two supplements, magnesium and riboflavin, that are helpful in preventing migraine.

Magnesium has been shown in several studies to be helpful for migraine prevention, and is frequently used for other reasons in pregnancy and is considered safe. One study used magnesium citrate doses of up to 600 mg per day.

Riboflavin (vitamin B-2) also has been shown to reduce migraines at a dose of 400 mg daily.

Tylenol generally is considered safe in pregnancy at reasonable doses, and is probably your best bet for treating a migraine already in place. As far as dietary restrictions go, find your personal dietary triggers, if any, and avoid them.

**Dr. Roach Writes:** In March I wrote a column on personal lubricants and made some product suggestions. # Crowd gathers for Chu

BRIDGEPORT — They kept filing into the Wonderland of Ice — girls, boys, teenagers, and a bunch of adults, too. They all came to honor the local girl who grew up into one of her nation's most respected athletes.

Julie Chu received the key to the city and the key to the rink Sunday afternoon. She also received visitors for two hours, signing autographs and talking with everyone who came through the line to meet her. And everyone, like Lucie and Anna Collimore, of Fairfield, got a chance to hold her heavy (as more than one youngster said) silver medal from this year's Olympic women's hockey competition.

"It's pretty awesome, holding the medal; I don't know, it's surreal," Anna Collimore said. Lucie Collimore said, "She comes from the same place we come from. She kind of went on the path we want to go."

Chu's path often seems to bring her back to Wonderland.

"This is my home, always," Chu said to the crowd. "This is the rink where it all began. This is where I learned to love hockey."

Audrey Choi, 12, of Weston, has done the same, playing for the Wonderland Wizards. She'd been to a few different camps hoping to meet Chu, but had never caught up with her until Sunday.

"She's an inspiration," Choi said. She shows, Choi said, you don't necessarily have to grow up in a certain place or a certain atmosphere to reach the top.

About 300 fans, friends

and family members came through the lobby at Wonderland, taking photos with Chu and the medal.

"She wants to give back," said her mother, Miriam Chu. "She does everything she can with every kid."

The kids and their parents cheered when Bridgeport Mayor Bill Finch asked how proud they were of Chu.

"Many times we put on the Winter Olympics to see Julie perform marvelously on the big stage," Finch said. "A little bit of Bridgeport goes with you. You're a role model."

"It's a great thing to hold up somebody like Julie Chu ... who competed at the collegiate level, played in the Olympics, played for a national championship. She's done every single thing a female athlete can do in the sport of hockey."

She also carried her country's flag in the closing ceremonies in Sochi on Feb. 23.

"I'm still processing (carrying) the flag," Chu said. "To be bestowed with that honor by your teammates is amazing. There are so many talented athletes who could've carried the flag for our nation."

They chose the four-time Olympian, who came agonizingly close to her first gold medal. A bit more luck as a puck slid toward an empty net late in regulation, a bit more luck with some curious officiating in overtime, and the United States could've been Olympic champions for the second time.

The luck went the other way, and Canada tied it late and won it on an overtime power play.

"I'm so proud of our team," Chu said. "Everyone wants to focus on just that

one game, the last few minutes, but I'm proud of how much we've grown from 2010 to 2014. We were an improved team."

"The true test of that team is to see how we responded in overtime. We came out and almost won that game right off the bat."

She said she hasn't determined what's next hockey-wise.

"It's such an emotional high at the Olympics; I'm still decompressing," Chu said.

In the meantime, she has traveled a lot, been to the White House twice, given speeches for her corporate sponsors, and finally came home Sunday.

"It's amazing now to be able to share my silver with the Wonderland of Ice and my friends and family," Chu said.
